"Land"

One of the most beautiful but haunting films of the year is **Land**, the directorial debut of Robin Wright.

Wright portrays Edee Holzer, a woman whose life has been shattered by the death of her husband and young son. Consumed by grief, Edee resolves to escape the world for a small, isolated cabin in the mountains of Wyoming. So intent is she on being alone that, when she sees an incoming call from her worried sister, she throws her phone in the nearest trash bin.

Arriving at the cabin, she unloads her rental truck and then asks the owner of the place to return the vehicle for her. "It's not a good idea to be here without a vehicle," he warns.

"I'll be fine," Edee replied.

But as the beautiful mountain fall turns into a harsh mountain winter, Edee is soon not fine. She realizes how ill prepared she is to live alone in the wild. Out of food and fuel, Edee huddles in the shack waiting for the end.

Miguel Borrás, who hunts in these mountains, finds her, dehydrated and starving. Miguel summons his sister Alawa, a nurse, and the two manage to bring Edee back from the brink of death.

Miguel understands that something devastating has brought Edee to this place and respects that. Over time he earns Edee's trust. He offers to teach her to hunt and fish and set traps — in a word, survive — and then promises to let her be, no questions asked. Edee is grateful but asks Miguel, "Why are you helping me?"

"You were in my path," Miguel replies.

Miguel is no stranger to pain and grief. He understands that everyone heals differently — but he also recognizes the arrogance and egotism that have made Edee's grief so destructive. "I'm here in this place because I don't want to be around people," Edee says. Miguel responds in his gentle manner, "Only a person who has never been hungry thinks starving is a good way to die."

Miguel has dealt with his own devastating grief and guilt — but has found his way through it by being "alone among others." His greatest kindness is giving Edee the time and space to find her way through her pain and, in the simple, touching ending to the film, provides the means for Edee to find her way off the mountain of despair.

Despite the trauma and grief we shoulder, we don't bear our crosses alone; despite those times when "don't want to be around people," the reality is that we need one another to survive. Miguel's understanding and kindness mirrors the reality of today's Gospel: that we are connected to one another as "branches" of the vine of God's love. On the night before he died, Jesus reminds his disciples of every time and place that, in his love, we are "grafted" to one another in ways we do not completely realize or understand or appreciate. Sometimes that means giving one another the space to be alone — but alone in the embrace of the Father's love.

Lessons of the pandemic

It began with everyone suddenly being afraid of one another. Anyone could be a carrier of the virus, even our spouse. We avoided each other, we masked, we washed our chapped hands again and again; we have lived in our own safe, protected, and, lonely, bubbles.

For thousands of families this has been a time of indescribable loss. Some of us will be living with the scars of this forever.

It's been a long 14 months.

No one ever wants to go back to what we've been through, but some good things have resulted.

Those mostly invisible among us have become visible. Caregivers, factory workers, public works personnel who keep our towns and cities functioning, supermarket drivers, and stockers, so many low-profile (and even lower paid) workers we took for granted we now see with gratitude and respect for the ways they make our lives work.

We've redefined the meaning of hero. “Super” men and women have stethoscopes hanging around their necks and are covered in PPE and they don't go home as long as someone needs them.

We have a new appreciation for our work, and the opportunity to work.

We've discovered that school is more than textbooks and term papers: education is about building a learning community, helping one another through the hard lessons, that discovering that the most important lesson we will ever learn is respect for the gifts of others.

Most of us will tell you that Zoom is OK as far as it goes, but a “virtual” classroom or church can't replace face-to-face learning, creating, engagement, and prayer.

And we've come to realize that what we need most in our lives cannot be monetized. You can't put a price tag on a hug from your grandchild or a simple “How's it going?” from your best friend.

This pandemic has instilled in many of us a new appreciation of today's Gospel: our “connectedness” to one another in the compassion and peace of God's Christ. As branches of Christ the vine, we're part of something greater than ourselves, something which transforms and transcends the fragility of our lives. In our simplest acts of kindness and most ordinary offerings of help and support, may we realize with a new spirit of gratitude that we are part of one another, that each one of us matters to all of us, that in our love and respect for one another we realize the very presence of God in our midst.

No one should attend Mass if they are feeling sick or have been in proximity to someone with COVID19 symptoms or someone who has been out of the country in the last 14 days.

Communion

Ushers will be in the side aisles directing each pew to go forward to Communion. Please remember to always keep 6 feet social distancing. There will be another usher to direct you to a blue tape on the floor and then you will proceed to the blue tape box to receive communion in your hand only. Step to the next blue tape box and lift your mask to consume the Eucharist.

You will then be guided to the middle aisle to return to your seat.

After Mass, your will follow the ushers direction to the exit door and immediately return to your car.

PARKING SAFELY AND LEGALLY

Please park only in marked stalls. Do not park in the aisles not marked, as we must, by law, have access for emergency vehicles. There is "No Parking" against the St. Elizabeth Ann Seton building or in between the school and the Hospitality Pavilion which is marked "No Parking." Only people with handicapped signs from the DMV are to use the handicapped parking places marked on the North side of the school. The front of the rectory and church on Chatsworth Street is marked by the city "no parking." You may be ticketed if you park there. Also, the Fire Department has specifically asked us to remind parishioners there is by law "No Parking" 15 feet on either side of the fire hydrant on Hayvenhurst Ave.

We know you realize how important it is to be on time for Mass. Please arrive early enough to safely and legally park and still be to Mass on time.

BEARING FRUIT

Few of us, even when we meditate on the image of the vine and branches, stop to really think about how God “prunes” us. For some there is the danger of thinking that we are already producing fruit for the kingdom, in deed and truth as John says, perhaps raising a family, being active in our parish, and so on. But even those branches which are bearing fruit, the Gospel tells us, can be pruned to produce still more. Today Saul, freshly “pruned” by his conversion, arrives in Jerusalem and meets resistance. Since he had been persecuting Christians, this was only natural. But even after he is accepted and begins to bear fruit, he meets further adversity, and his letters are filled with many accounts of how his trials “pruned” him to produce greater fruit for the kingdom. Like him, as long as we remain in Christ we will continue to bear fruit and, when the will of the Father determines it is time to prune us, the strength of the true vine must enable us to endure it.
